Vessel Safety Check



Get a Vessel Safety Check

By Past District Commander Bill Stano, JN Vessel Safety Chair

A Vessel Safety Check is a 15-point inspection which takes about 15-30 minutes and ensures your boat is in full compliance with all Federal and State boating laws. A Vessel Safety Check is FREE and Voluntary! If you do not pass, the vessel exam, the vessel examiner does not issue fines or contact law enforcement agencies however you can correct the deficiencies and have your boat re-examined, so it passes. Having a Vessel Safety Check, you gain the knowledge of the importance of compliance with the boating safety laws and how having the required safety equipment on board your boat saves lives. Boats that pass the examination are awarded a

VSC Decal that alerts the Coast Guard and other law-enforcement agencies that your boat was found to be in full compliance with all Federal and State boating laws.

As of this writing, the U.S. Coast Guard, District 9 is allowing the Power Squadron and the Coast Guard Auxiliary to perform vessel safety checks in the Great Lakes Region. We have procedures in place to keep the boat owner and vessel examiner safe.

Spring Checklist

The BoatU.S. Spring Commissioning Checklist

Before You Launch:

- ☐ Hose clamps should be inspected and replaced as necessary. Double clamping hose connections with marinerated stainless hose clamps, or keeping seacocks closed when you are away, are wise moves.
- ☐ Inspect cooling hoses for stiffness, rot, leaks and cracking.

 Make sure they fit snugly.
- Replace deteriorated sacrificial anodes.
- ☐ Inspect prop(s) for dings, pitting, and distortion. Make sure cotter pins are secure. Grip the prop and try moving the shaft; if it's loose, the cutlass bearing (on inboard drive systems) may need to be replaced.
- Check to make sure the rudderstock hasn't been bent.
- ☐ Inspect the hull for blisters, distortions and stress cracks.
- ☐ Make sure your engine intake sea strainer is not cracked or bent from ice, is free of corrosion, clean, and properly secured.
- ☐ With inboards, check the engine shaft and rudder stuffing boxes for looseness. A stuffing box should only leak when the prop shaft is turning, and needs to be inspected routinely.
- Inspect and lubricate seacocks.
- Use a garden hose to check for deck leaks at ports and hatches. Renew caulk or gaskets, as necessary.
- ☐ If equipped, ensure that the stern drain plug is installed.
- ☐ After the boat is launched, be sure to check all through-hulls for leaks.



Failure to install the bilge drain plug is a leading cause of boat sinkings. Consider coating the threads with anti-seize and giving it a half turn past hand-tight with a wrench to secure it.

Engines and Fuel Systems:

- ☐ Inspect rubber outdrive bellows for cracked, dried, and/or deteriorated spots (look especially in the folds), and replace if suspect.
- ☐ Check power steering and power trim oil levels.
- ☐ Replace anodes that are more than half worn away.
- Inspect outer jacket of control cables. Cracks or swelling indicate corrosion and mean that the cable must be replaced.
- ☐ Inspect fuel lines, including fill and vent hoses, for softness, brittleness, or cracking. Check all joints for leaks and make sure all lines are well supported with non-combustible clips or straps with smooth edges.
- ☐ Inspect fuel tanks, fuel pumps, and filters for leaks. Clamps should be snug and free of rust. Clean or replace fuel filters. Owners of gasoline-powered boats with fiberglass fuel tanks should consult a marine professional to inspect for any ethanol-related issues.
- ☐ Every few years, remove and inspect exhaust manifold for corrosion.
- ☐ Clean and tighten electrical connections, especially both ends of battery cables. Wire-brush battery terminals and fill cells with distilled water (if applicable).
- Inspect bilge blower hose for leaks.
- ☐ Coat threads with anti-seize and insert bilge plug. Hand tighten and then give it a half turn with a wrench.
- ☐ Get a free vessel safety check from the US Coast Guard Auxiliary or US Power Squadrons. Find out more at www.SafetySeal.net.

PLAN FOR AN EFFECTIVE WRAP-UP



End with a quick recap providing decisions made and actions agreed on.






FROM THE GALLEY Grilled Butter with Blue Che



Grilled Butternut Squash with Blue Cheese and Walnuts


Serves 2 crew members

STOCK YOUR GALLEY WITH:

1 large (2-3 lb) butternut squash 1/2 cup coconut oil, warmed and softened

1/2 cup brown sugar

- 1 teaspoon crushed black pepper
- 1/4 cup blue cheese crumbles
- 2 tablespoons walnuts, finely chopped



INSTRUCTIONS:

Heat your boat grill to a medium/high setting. Cut your butternut squash in half lengthwise, and remove the seeds with a spoon. Leaving the skin on, cut the squash into 1/2 inch slices—making a half moon shape—and set them aside.

In a mixing bowl, add the warmed and softened coconut oil, the brown sugar, and the crushed black pepper. Then, whisk together.

Next, dip those half moon slices of delicious squash into the mixture and give them a good soak just before adding them to the hot grill. Turn them often to prevent the sugar from burning. They will cook quickly, so only 3-4 minutes on each side will suffice.

Once the squash is tender and you notice

grill marks, remove them from the heat and pile them on a serving platter. While still hot, sprinkle the blue cheese crumbles and the finely chopped walnuts on top before serving. The crumbles will slightly melt and become creamy and the walnuts will give a satisfying little crunch to the dish. Holy "SNOW," that sounds good!

First Mate Facts: Batanically speaking, butternut squash would be considered a fruit but is used in the culinary world as a vegetable!




In the "Test Kitchen of LIfe
