



Reach, Throw, Row, Don't Go!

When someone falls out of the Boat - Four basic steps to help.

When someone falls out of the Boat - Four basic steps to help.

- 1) **REACH** With hand, pole non-metal if concerned for electric shock. While you are hanging on to boat or dock. Don't Go In.
- 2) **THROW** A flotation ring for the person to grab if you are too far to reach.
- 3) **ROW** If you are in a smaller boat to get closer to person. Or call for help. Don't swing boat around and propeller close to victim.
 - 4) DON'T GO Into the water. Call for help.



Boats can be a great source of summer fun and leisure. But, boaters, swimmers, and marina staff must be aware of dangers in and around the water. Electrical hazards and carbon monoxide (CO) bring unique risks to the boating world. Learn to protect people and pets from these dangers.

ELECTRICAL SAFETY

- Never allow swimming near the boat, marina, or launching ramp. Residual current could flow into the water from the boat or the marina's wiring. This can put anyone at risk of electrical shock drownings (ESD).
- Be sure your boat is well maintained. Have it inspected each year. Ask a qualified marine electrician to do this job.
-))) Ground fault circuit interrupters (GFCIs) and equipment leakage circuit interrupters (ELCIs) should be installed and tested monthly. Run tests to find out if electrical current is leaking from the boat.
- Only use cords intended for marine use. Never use household cords near water.
- Mow where your main breakers are on both the boat and the shore power source. This will help you respond quickly in an emergency.

CARBON MONOXIDE SAFETY

- Poorly tuned engines produce more CO. Keep your engine properly maintained. Follow manufacturer's instructions for service.
- Proper ventilation for engine and generator exhaust vents must be clear and pipes should be inspected for leaks.
- Set into fresh air right away and get help if you feel symptoms of CO poisoning. These include headache, fatigue, confusion, dizziness, nausea, or seizures. The symptoms can be similar to seasickness. Assume it is CO exposure until you are sure the boat is safe.
- Do not swim near the boat's exhaust vents. CO accumulates there.
- Install CO alarms inside your boat. Test CO alarms before each trip.
- Choose a CO alarm that is listed by a qualified testing laboratory.
-))) If the CO alarm sounds, move to a fresh air location right away.

KNOW THE RISKS!

Electrical shock drownings can occur when marina electrical systems leak electrical current into the water. Boats can also serve as the source of an electrical leakage. Leakage can cause a shock that can injure, disable, or kill a person.

Carbon Monoxide is a gas you cannot see, taste, or smell. It is often called the "invisible killer." CO is created when fuels such as gasoline, diesel, or propane do not burn fully. CO is also produced when wood or charcoal is burned.

Sources of CO on your boat may include engines, gas generators, and cooking ranges. Space and water heaters can also be sources of CO. CO can collect anywhere in or around a boat. The gas is harmful to both people and to pets.

FACT

CO can remain in or around your boat at unsafe levels even if the engine has been turned off.



NO SWIMMING AROUND ELECTRICITY!

Electric Shock Drowning (ESD)

Danger lurks closer to home than you think...

Never swim around docks and boats powered with electricity!!

Electricity Is a Swift Killer Invisible - Odorless - Silent

Consider these simple questions:

- Would you plug in and use an electrical appliance while taking a bath?
- Do you realize that a boat with an electrical cord is a "plugged-in" appliance? And the water around the boat is like the bathtub?
- Can you see any inherent dangers in running electricity to docks exposed to the harsh marine environment?
- How well do water and electricity mix? Not very well, as we all know.

ELECTRIC SHOCK DROWNING (ESD) Q & A

- 1. What is ESD? It's a drowning resulting from paralysis caused by electrical currents in the water. If the electric current is high enough, electrocution occurs.
- 2. What causes ESD? Electricity leaking into water around boats and docks using electrical power. These leaks come from faulty electrical equipment and wiring, and improper grounding. Beware, it may come from a neighbor's dock.
- **3. How much electricity causes injury or death?** As little as 10 milliamps (1/50th the current used by a 60 watt light bulb) can cause paralysis/drowning. Sixty milliamps in the body can cause heart failure.
- **4. Is ESD a common problem?** Hundreds of injuries and deaths have been documented (could be many, many more). It is only by witness reports or investigation that these events can be attributed to ESD.
- **5. Why is freshwater more dangerous?** In freshwater the human body is much more conductive than the water itself. So, more current flows through the body in freshwater than in saltwater.
- **6. Why are we swimming around docks and boats powered with electricity?** It's our culture. We have always used lakes, rivers, and ponds for swimming. Then we added electricity to the docks for lights, boats, appliances. But swimming persists in light of the danger electricity presents.
- **7. If you feel a tingle? Stop!** Turn around. Go back to where there was no tingle. Swim away! Warn others. Get out and turn off power any way you can.
- **8. If you witness an ESD?** Turn power off, throw a life ring, try to move the person away with a nonconductive pole or object. Don't pull the person toward to the dock. DO NOT JUMP IN TO HELP (you will become a casualty). Call 911!

9. How can ESD be prevented?

- a. Don't swim around docks and boats using electricity!! Consider the ENTIRE dock dangerous.
 - Find a swimming location at least 50 yds from any electrically-powered docks.
 - Post signs around your dock to notify others of the potential dangers.
 Example: "NO SWIMMING, DANGER OF ELECTROCUTION"
- b. Follow current codes and standards. NFPA 70 (NEC) and NFPA 303 (Marinas and Boatyards) address electrical standards and inspection requirements for dock and marina safety (www.nfpa.org). The American Boat and Yacht Council (ABYC) covers electrical standards for boats (www.abycinc.org).
 - · Codes and standards protect when water is entered accidentally.
 - Install ground fault protection on all electrical systems used by docks and boats.
 - Inspect all dock and boat electrical systems annually and after periods of violent weather.
 - Only allow electrical work and inspection by licensed or otherwise qualified personnel.
- c. Spread the word about this danger in your local community. Distribute literature like this brochure. Visit the Electric Shock Drowning Prevention Association website (www.electricshockdrowning.org) for more information and resources.



- Be Accepted By The Squadron Executive Committee




